## MAYOR'S COLUMN

**A**lthough still in its infancy, the South Daytona Community Trust Fund through which assistance is provided to residents in need already has proven to be a source of pride in our community. That's especially true because the fund established by the City Council involves not a single dollar of property tax revenue or other public money.

Instead, the fund operates solely with money derived from special events in which the City participates, such as the Mayor's Golf Cup Tournament, contributions of labor and materials from the business community and private donations.

To date, more than \$44,000 worth of roof repairs, heating and air-conditioning services and sewer line repairs including labor costs has been provided for eight struggling homeowners. The homeowners, due to current economic conditions or other circumstances, lacked the resources necessary to accomplish such repairs but did not qualify for assistance through state and/or federal programs.



However, it's one thing to be aware of problems, but quite another to be able to ascertain just what is needed to be done and then to know how to ensure the proper permitting and performance standards are followed. In that regard, the City "is extremely fortunate, even blessed, to have the absolutely best person in absolutely the perfect place to make it all happen," according to City Manager Joe Yarbrough.



"Who better than Helen Wert, assistant community development director, and where better than the Community Development Department that encompasses all of our building regulation operations," Yarbrough said. Wert is the driving force behind the success of the Community Trust Fund, and for every trust fund dollar that has been spent she has managed to gain two-and-half-times that amount in donated goods and services.

Regarded as a committed professional with steadfast adherence to professional standards, Wert nevertheless downplays the importance of the number of hours she contributes to Community Trust endeavors. In addition to receiving well-deserved praise from City Council members, coworkers and those whose lives she helps to enhance, the City has nominated Wert for selection as Volusia League of Cities Employee of the Year. Specifically, the City's nomination of Wert for VLOC selection cites "her tireless efforts to improve the quality of life in the community."

## VICE-MAYOR RECOGNIZED

At the recent annual City Employee Awards Luncheon, the service to the City of Vice-Mayor Ron Clifton also was recognized. Clifton has been a member of the City Council since November 1994.

## COUNCIL ACTIONS

An ordinance amending the Land Development Code to permit establishment of RV (Recreational Vehicle) parks in the City's Heavy Business Commercial and Light Industrial zoning districts has been adopted by the City Council.

Allowance of RV parks within either of the two zoning districts is based on a staff recommendation that notes such establishments can be viable businesses in the proper location with proper regulation.

Establishment will require a special zoning exception requiring initial Planning and Land Development Regulation Board and subsequent City Council approvals, ensuring a number of site size, layout, utility and screening requirements are met beforehand.

In other action, the Council decided to reject the sole bid received and to retain ownership for future City sale of an estimated 125,000 cubic yards of fill dirt, much of which is being stored on the south side of Reed Canal Road just west of Ridgewood Avenue.

The fill dirt stems from ongoing construction of an 8-acre stormwater retention basin on the north side of Reed Canal further west from the storage site.

In cases of three or more candidates for a District Seat, a candidate gaining more than 50 percent of the vote in a contest will win election. Otherwise, the two candidates with the most votes will appear on a Tuesday, Nov. 2 runoff election ballot.

The voter registration deadline for the Aug. 24 general election is Monday, July 26. For a Nov. 2 runoff election, the registration deadline is Monday, Oct. 4.



There are four City election precincts – Precinct 701, Police Department Training Room, 1672 S. Ridgewood Ave.; Precinct 702, South Daytona Christian Church, 2121 Kenilworth Ave.; and Precincts 703 and 704, Piggotte Community Center, 504 Big Tree Road.

## WANDERER BRACELET PROGRAM

## ELECTION QUALIFYING BEGINS

Candidate qualifying documents for the upcoming City election are now available at City Hall in the office of Deputy City Clerk Debbie Fitz-Gerald.

The two City Council district seats up for election this year, to four-year terms, are those of Councilwoman Nancy Long (Seat 2) and Councilman Kenneth McMillen (Seat 3).

Candidate qualifying period will begin at noon on Monday, June 14 and end at noon on Friday, June 18. All qualified candidates will appear on the Tuesday, Aug. 24 general election ballot.

## RESIDENTS NOW MAY TRACK CRIME IN THEIR NEIGHBORHOODS

A newly-launched on-line crime mapping system allows South Daytona residents to track crimes committed in their neighborhood.

In cooperation with the Volusia County Sheriff's Office, the Crime Mapping program tracks crime in 14 different categories in participating cities. Residents can access this information through a link at the City's Web site at [www.southdaytona.org](http://www.southdaytona.org). From the City home page, select the government pull-down menu on the top of the page, then the Police Department, and from there click on the Crime Maps icon on the right side of the screen.

Users can **view crimes** plotted out on a map within a specific geographic area, date range or crime category. The program is updated twice daily through the computer dispatch system and tracks arson, assault, burglary, disturbing the peace, drug and alcohol violations, DUI, fraud, homicide, car theft and vehicle break-ins, robbery, theft, vandalism and weapons. Due to privacy issues, sex crimes are not included on the crime map. Residents also may register for e-mail crime alerts.



## REMINDER: CHANGE SMOKE DETECTOR BATTERIES

Did you change your smoke detector batteries on March 14? Traditionally, residents are encouraged to change smoke detector batteries on the second Sunday in March, when Daylight Savings Time begins.

The Fire Department would like to remind everyone to change their smoke detector batteries if they have not done so. Properly installed and maintained smoke alarms are one of the best ways to save lives and to prevent fire injuries.

### **Fire Prevention Tips:**

Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement.

Interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the home so that when one sounds, they all sound.

Test alarms at least monthly by pushing the test button.

Smoke rises, so install smoke alarms following manufacturer's instructions high on a wall or on a ceiling. Save manufacturer's instructions for testing and maintenance.



Remember that if you do not have a functioning smoke detector in your home, the Fire Department will install one **free of charge** to any South Daytona resident. To make an appointment, please call the Fire Department at 322-3033.

## FIRE DEPT. ACHIEVED TOP RATING

The Fire Department recently received an excellent evaluation from the Florida Department of Health's Emergency Medical Services Division. The statewide inspection program, done every two years, monitors the quality of patient care delivered by the Fire Department. State compliance officers inspect personnel records, service records, facilities and equipment. No deficiencies were found and the final report commended the department on the level of service it provides to the community.

# Flood Protection Information Alert

*The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) rates cities for risk of flooding and these ratings are used by insurance companies to establish premiums. NFIP is a division of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). In order for South Daytona to qualify for the best possible rating from NFIP, we must annually publish the following information. Please review it carefully, retain for reference, and contact Community Development at City Hall if you have any questions (386-322-3020).*

Flooding is an act of nature which respects no boundary lines, either community or personal. Flooding in South Daytona is caused by two sources: (1) the Halifax River, which may overflow its banks during severe storms and/or high tides; and (2) downpours of rain such as experienced during Tropical Storm Gordon in 1994 and recent hurricanes (2004). Flood water can cover many blocks up to four or five feet deep. County and City-owned canals have also been prone to flooding, but recent stormwater runoff control measures should minimize or eliminate this problem.

Flooding can come with little warning. In 1994 the streets were flooded within one hour after the rainstorm started. Since then the City has spent millions of dollars on stormwater drainage improvements. However, flooding will always be a possibility throughout the area due to our coastal location near sea level. Flood maps and flood protection references are available at the Daytona Beach (City Island) and Port Orange public libraries. You can also visit the Community Development Department at City Hall to see where your property is located on the FEMA Flood Maps. Also available is information on FEMA elevation certificates (since 1991), minimum elevations required for new construction and handouts for selecting an architect, engineer or contractor for flood damage repairs.

If requested, an inspector from the Building Department will visit your property to review its flood problems and analyze ways to prevent flooding or flood damage. Please contact (386) 322-3020.

## Flood Warning System:

The City has an interlocal agreement with Volusia County and other municipalities that provide for coordination of the emergency management plans of all communities and for the prompt dissemination of

information concerning storms and flooding. The Emergency Operations Center may be reached at (866) 345-0345. Dial 211 to reach United Way's First Call for Help/Disaster Response info line. Information is also provided by local television and radio stations, since their representatives are on the emergency response teams and are located at the County Command Center during emergencies. The following stations service the South Daytona/Volusia County area: AM/FM radio - WNDB 1150 AM and WHOG 95.7 FM; Television - WESH-2, WFTV-9, and WCEU-TV15; NOAA Weather Radio Frequency-162.400 MHz; and, <http://volusia.org/emergency>.

## Flood Insurance:

If you do not have flood insurance, contact your property insurance agent. Homeowner's insurance policies do not normally cover damage from floods. However, since South Daytona participates in the National Flood Insurance Program, you can purchase a separate flood insurance policy at a reduced rate. This type of insurance is backed by the Federal Government and is available to everyone, even if your property has previously been flooded. You will probably want to include your house's contents as most regular policies do not cover contents such as furniture. There is usually a 30-day waiting period before a flood insurance policy takes effect, so don't wait until a storm threatens before securing flood insurance.

## Flood Safety:

### BEFORE THE STORM...

If your home is well constructed, and local authorities have not called for evacuation, stay home and make emergency preparation. If told to evacuate, follow all instructions from local authorities and follow safe evacuation routes to shelter. Your personal evacuation plan should provide for your pets, your personal hurricane supplies (food, medicine, first-aid kit, battery-powered radio, flashlights, extra batteries, etc.) and insurance papers. When evacuating, take property identification and important personal papers and documents with you.

### DURING AND AFTER THE STORM...

If you are in a public shelter, remain there until informed by those in charge that it is safe to leave and return home. Oftentimes, people are injured immediately after a storm due to unsafe buildings, downed power lines, contaminated water, and other dangerous conditions. Carefully check for structural damage prior to entering a building after a storm, and use caution when entering. Turn electricity on one breaker at a time and watch for smoke or sparks. Report broken sewer and water lines to the Public Works Department at 322-3080.

Also, during a flood the following safety measures should be taken to prevent further personal and property damage:

Do not walk through flowing water. Drowning is the number one cause of flood deaths. Six inches of water can knock you off your feet. If you must walk in standing or flowing water, use a pole or stick to ensure that the ground is still there.

Do not drive into a flooded area. Many people drown in their cars. Don't drive around road barriers; the road may be washed out.

Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. The number two flood killer after drowning is electrocution. Electrical current can travel through water. Report downed power lines to Florida Power and Light or the City Public Works Department.

Have your electricity turned off by the Power Company. Some appliances, such as television sets, keep electrical charges even after they have been unplugged. Don't use appliances or motors that have gotten wet unless they have been taken apart, cleaned and dried.

Look out for small animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their homes may seek shelter in yours. Use a pole or stick to poke and turn things over and to scare away small animals and snakes.

Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and nails. Floors and stairs covered with mud can be slippery.

Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Never smoke or use candles, lanterns, matches or open flames unless you know the gas has been properly turned off and the entire area has been ventilated.

Carbon monoxide exhaust kills. Only use a generator or other gasoline powered equipment outdoors. The same goes for cooking stoves. Charcoal fumes are especially deadly -use charcoal outdoors only.

Clean everything that got wet. Flood waters pick up sewage and chemicals from roads, commercial properties and storage buildings. Spoiled food, flooded cosmetics, and medicines can be health hazards. *When in doubt, throw it out!*

### **Flood Protection:**

There are several ways to protect your building from flood damage. Elevation of the structure is a method to permanently retrofit. Another way is to keep the water away by regrading your lot or by constructing a small flood wall or earthen berm. These methods work if your lot is large enough, if flooding is not too deep, and if your property is not in the floodway.

Another approach is to make your walls waterproof and to place watertight closures over the doorways. This method is not recommended for houses with basements or if water will get over two feet deep.

"Wet flood-proofing" to modify the structure and relocate the contents is also helpful, so that when flood waters enter the building there is little or no damage. When a flood threatens it is always advisable to take the following emergency actions: sandbag to reduce erosion and scouring; elevate furniture above flood protection levels; and, seal off sewer lines to the dwelling to prevent the backflow of sewer waters.

The City Building Department, the Port Orange and City Island Public Libraries have information available regarding flood protection.

### **Requirements for Permits and Substantial Improvements:**

Always contact the City Building Department before you build on, alter, regrade, or fill on your property. A building permit is needed to ensure that projects do not cause flooding problems. New buildings in the flood plain must be protected from flood damage. Our building codes require that new buildings must be elevated at least one foot above the base flood elevation. Also, substantial improvements and/or damage to a building in the flood plain area which is accumulative over a ten-year period and exceeds 50% of the building value must meet the new Codes and protection.

### **Drainage System Maintenance:**

The City of South Daytona Public Works Department makes inspections and maintains all City-owned ditches and canals and has maintenance contracts for aquatic weed control. You can help the City with its drainage sys-

tem maintenance program by taking the following measures:

Do not dump or throw anything into the ditches or canals. Dumping in our ditches or canals is a violation of City of South Daytona Ordinance Section 10-9. Even grass clippings and branches can accumulate and block stormwater flow. A plugged ditch or canal cannot carry water, and when it rains the water needs to go somewhere. Every piece of trash contributes to flooding.

If your property is next to a ditch or canal, please do your part and keep the banks clear of brush and debris. The City has a ditch and canal maintenance program which can help remove major blockages such as downed trees.

If you see dumping or debris in the ditches or canals, contact the Public Works Department at 322-3080, Community Development at 322-3020, or Police Dispatch at 323-3568.

### **Natural and Beneficial Functions:**

Under natural conditions, a flood causes little or no damage. Nature ensures that floodplain flora and fauna can survive the more frequent inundations. This is the case along Reed Canal and the banks of the Halifax River. Reed Canal helps to reduce our flood damage by allowing flood waters to flow from the inner city to the Halifax River. Several stormwater retention areas have been installed throughout the City which draw stormwater from the adjacent subdivisions and store it until absorbed back into the ground, thus improving water quality. During major storms, the City also has the capability of pumping water from canals and retention areas to relieve neighborhood flooding.

# SOUTH DAYTONA'S CLEAN WATER PROGRAM

## April is Water Conservation Month

April traditionally is Florida's driest month, which makes it even more important to remember that efficient water use has major environmental, public health and economic benefits, helping to improve water quality, maintain aquatic ecosystems, protect drinking water resources and, if practiced broadly, can help mitigate the effects of drought.

**Efficient use also helps reduce water and energy bills. A partial list of efficiency measures follows.**

**Bathroom** — Half of all in-house water use takes place here. Don't let water run while shaving or brushing teeth; take short showers instead of tub baths and turn off water while soaping or shampooing. If a tub is used, close the drain before turning on water and fill only half full

**Kitchen and Laundry** — Keep drinking water in the refrigerator instead of letting the faucet run until the water is cool, wash fruits and vegetables in a basin using a vegetable brush. Don't use water to defrost frozen foods - thaw in the refrigerator overnight. Scrape, rather than rinse, dishes before loading the dishwasher and wash only full loads. Add food wastes to a compost pile instead of using the garbage disposal. Wash only full loads of laundry or use the appropriate water level or load size selection on the washing machine.

**Equipment** — Homes with high-efficiency plumbing fixtures and appliances save about 30% of indoor water use and yield substantial savings on water, sewer, and energy bills. Consider purchasing high-efficiency toilets, or place a plastic container filled with water in the tanks of conventional toilets while ensuring they don't interfere with flush mechanisms. Install low-flow faucet aerators and showerheads. Consider purchasing a high efficiency washing machine that can save over 50% in laundry water and energy use. Repair all leaks. A leaky toilet can waste 200 gallons per day.

**Landscape Irrigation** — Depending on climate and drought-caused watering restrictions, up to 75% of a home's total water use during the growing season is for outdoor purposes. Detect and repair all irrigation system leaks. Water lawns or garden during the coolest part of the day (early morning is best). Do not water on windy days. Water trees and shrubs with deep root systems longer and less frequently than shallow-rooted plants that require smaller amounts of water more often. Set sprinklers to water lawn or garden only, not the street or sidewalk. Install moisture sensors on sprinkler systems.

**Other Outdoor Uses** — When using a hose, control the flow with an automatic shut-off nozzle. Avoid purchasing recreational water toys requiring a constant water stream. Consider purchase of a water-saving swimming pool filter and use a pool cover to reduce evaporation when pool is not being used.

## ***Volusia County's restrictions for yard watering and private car washing March 14 through Nov. 6:***

### **Even numbered addresses:**

*4 - 8 a.m. (automatic and manual systems) or 5 □ 9 p.m. (manual only) Thursdays and Sundays.*

### **Odd numbered addresses:**

*4 - 8 a.m. (automatic and manual systems) or 5 □ 9 p.m. (manual only) on Wednesdays and Saturdays.*

*Private automobile washing may be done only during the above hours and days. No watering or car washing is permitted on Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays.*

**The above applies to ALL water sources including private wells, city water and lakes.**

*Watering of new vegetation plantings (sod, seed, landscape plants, etc.) is permitted on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 2 a.m. to 8 a.m. for automatic systems. Manual systems may irrigate from 2 a.m. to 8 a.m. and from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. This new planting irrigation schedule applies only during the first 30 days of planting.*

*Hand watering is permitted anytime, but avoidance of hours of high evaporation is encouraged.*
