## Message from Chief Brant...

am delighted to present the South Daytona Fire Department's Monthly Report for October. As a transparent agency, we believe in sharing our actions with the City Council, City Manager, department members, and the public every month.

First and foremost, I want to express my gratitude to the South Daytona Fire Department. We had a remarkable month in October, during which we educated over 1000 children on fire Safety. As the fire chief, I am delighted to witness the success of our fire safety education program. I am confident that these kids will pass on what they have learned to their friends, family, and community. I am extremely proud of our crews who showed great attitude and love for this community during these events.

It is customary for fire departments nationwide to shut down all events besides fire safety education and calls for service during October. However, that was not the case with the South Daytona Fire Department. Our firefighters continued to train and educate themselves by taking rope rescue, forcible entry, and college classes. Additionally, some of our employees taught these classes to firefighters in the county.

All our employees are currently enrolled in outside classes to improve themselves. Six employees are enrolled in college, three are taking high-level technical rescue classes, several have received their Fire Officer II certification, and three others are registered in the Fire Officer I series.

I am immensely proud of the South Daytona Fire Department's members, and I couldn't be happier to work with such dedicated individuals who strive to make South Daytona a safer place to live.




### South Daytona Fire Department

## October Is National Fire Prevention Month

During the month of October, Fire Departments all around the nation celebrate. Fire Prevention Month. South Daytona Fire Department prides itself on educating the younger generations on learning about firefighters, fire prevention, and understanding fire behavior. Countless hours go into the planning, scheduling, and preparation months in advance to make sure the local schools and daycares have a wonderful and educational experience in October.

We kick fire prevention month off with "Movie in the Park" where residents go out to Reed Canal Park and learn what to do if a fire starts in their home, watch a firefighter bunk out into gear, and watch a fire prevention video before the movie starts. We then continued our fire prevention month by going to schools and daycares in and around South Daytona, or we allowed them to come to our fire station to educate the kids on fire safety. Allowing the kids to come to our station gives them not only a learning experience on fire safety but also shows what firefighters do daily and what a real-life fire station looks like.

During their visit, the firefighters are tasked to show and explain a fire safety video that goes into detail about smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, fire escape plans, and fire science. The firefighters also get bunked out in their gear that is demonstrated, timed, or raced against another firefighter. We give a tour of the station with a detailed close experience about the fire engines a chance to flow water from a fire hose, and have one-on-one conversations with firefighters. For each age group that comes through our fire prevention tour, fire safety means and looks different.


For kids that are three, four, and five, fire safety might mean understanding what a firefighter looks like in all their gear and not being afraid of us in case of an emergency. Six and sevenyear-olds can now understand a fire triangle and the elements to make or eliminate a fire. they can also start to learn the important use of a smoke detector and how often a battery should be replaced. Eight, nine, and ten-year-olds can start to understand how fire extinguishers work and, the tools firefighters use, and remember the fire escape plans they have seen in previous years.

I am very proud to say that this year we interacted with five schools (VPK - 5th Grade) and three daycares totaling to a combined one thousand kids being engaged in fire safety. Each one of those kids were able to take home a fire escape plan booklet to go over with their families to have a plan of actions in case a fire broke out in their home to save a life.

#### CALL HIGHLIGHTS:

- Total of 197 calls; as shown in the graph above, the department responded to more ALS calls than BLS
- 17 calls within County District were responded to, which is lower than the normal rate.
- Port Orange responded to our city 9 times and Daytona Beach responded 5 times; both due to overlapping calls.
- Both agencies responded to our city 10 times due to our engine being out of service for Fire Prevention and training session in the County.

October was National Fire Prevention Month and historically, it's a hectic month for the department. Our fire prevention program was exceptionally busy this year. On average, the fire crews had at least three days a week where they received 100 or more kids per day. During these days, the kids were taught about fire prevention and shown the engine, with the highlight of their visit was being able to spray water through a fire hose. We also had the Movie in the Park and the Drive-thru-Boo this month, with both events being very successful thanks to the help of the Fire Department crews and the Parks & Rec Department.

The crews also participated in a training session that Volusia County hosted called Through-the-Lock, this training helped hone the crew's forcible entry skills. B-shift also participated in a county-wide Active Shooter Training that was held at the Daytona International Speedway.; law enforcement and fire departments from across the county were involved in this one-day event. The goal of the Active Shooter Training was to show both agencies where improvement is needed in case this horrible event ever happens in Volusia County.
